As they navigate through the challenges of pursuing their creative passions, Tara and Veena find solace and inspiration in each other's company. Their shared dreams and unwavering support for one another propel them forward, transforming their individual struggles into a collective journey towards success and self-discovery. In one such interaction Veena consoles and motivates her friend saying-

"Tara! Trust my words. I believe in your talent as a writer. Your words have the power to touch hearts and inspire change. Don't let self-doubt hold you back. Embrace the challenges and keep pushing forward. Your unique perspective is needed in the world of literature. Remember, every great writer starts as a beginner. So, keep writing, keep honing your craft, and never stop believing in yourself. You have what it takes to make a difference." (FF, pp2)

Tara realized that her self-doubt was just a hurdle she needed to overcome, and she felt determined to embrace the challenges ahead. She knew that her unique perspective could bring something new and valuable to the world of literature, and she was ready to keep writing, honing her craft, and making a difference. Thus, through thick and thin their friendship wins over. Similary, the remaining short stories also revolve around episodes where women were subjected to humiliation either owing to destiny driven situation or their own making. But, they rise and shine once the clouds of illusion are cleared.

This short story collection though with short episodes of a kind of urgency do not fail to impress upon the major concern related to women in contemporary times. "Being a single woman and a widow, do you think you can handle the demands of such a high-pressure job? The interviewer's comment though not expected in any formal interview set-up, was a misfortune that turned into an opportunity for Amrita. (FF, pp8)

Amrita in Tiwari's story is an empowered lady who instead of succumbing to societal expectations, chooses to embrace her independence and pursue her career. Despite facing adversity, she remains determined to prove that being single and a widow does not define her ability to excel in her chosen field. She is no time musters to retort with grace and poise and responds,

"My marital status has no bearing on my ability to excel in this role. I have proven my capabilities in previous positions, and I am fully committed to dedicating myself to this job." (FF, pp8)

Over a period of time, Amrita evolves into a champion fighting for the cause of single women by joining hands with other women who have also experienced some kind of differential treatment but chose to remain mute. Thus, Tiwari's protagonist, Amrita, becomes a harbinger of change in spite of destiny deprived her of conjugal bliss of a life partner.

Throughout her short stories, she underscores the importance of recognizing the diverse struggles faced by women. Within her narratives, characters from varying socio-economic backgrounds, ethnicities, and sexual orientations forge connections and build networks of support. This emphasis on the power of sisterhood echoes feminist theories that call for solidarity among women to dismantle systems of oppression. The story revolves around Sara, a young woman who enters into a marriage with high hopes and expectations.
