# On The Fractional Integral Operators Associated With Certain Generalized Hypergeometric Function for Real Positive Definite Symmetric Matrix

#### Abstract

In the present paper fractional integral operators associated with I-function for real positive symmetric definite matrix have been discussed. These operators have a wide range of applications in the field of Mathematical Physics and Linear differential equations. A number of special cases of our operators have been mentioned.

## I. Introduction

Fractional integration is an immediate generalization of repeated integration. Fractional integral operators occur in the solutions of linear differential equations, partial differential equations and in the integral representations of hypergeometric functions of one or more variables. Riesz [6] and Garding [2] respectively introduced Riemann-Liouville integral of vector and matrix variables and applied them in the solution of differential equation associated with Cauchy's problem.

## (1.1) $I$-function with matrix argument

Let $X$ is a $p \times p$ real symmetric positive definite matrix of functionally independent variables. Let the $I$ function of $X$ be denoted by

It is assumed that $I(X Y)=I(Y X)$ for real symmetric $m \times m$ positive definite matrices $X$ and $Y, I(X)$ is defined by the following integral equation:

## (1.2) Matrix transform

A generalized matrix transform or M-transform of a function $f(X)$ of a $m \times m$ real symmetric positive definite or strictly negative definite matrix $X$ is defined as follows:

Whenever $\quad M_{f}(s)$ exists. Also $f(X)$ is assumed to be a symmetric function i.e. $f(B X)=f(X B)=f\left(B^{1 / 2} X B^{1 / 2}\right)$ for $B=B^{\prime}>0$. When $X<0$ replace $X$ by $-X$ in $M$-transform.

The last condition ensures that $Y[f(X)]$ and $N[f(X)]$ both exist and also both belong to $L_{P_{i}}(0, \infty)$.

## II. Main Results

The following theorems of the operators defined by (1.7) and (1.8) have been established in the expression of matrix transform:
